



Dear all,

I hope you are all well and are looking forward to some time together with families and friends over the festive season. It seems incredible that Christmas eve is only five Friday's away and I'm sure that just like me, you are all hoping for some time to celebrate without the restrictions we were under not so long ago.

Before I get onto the meat of this week's newsletter, it's worth mentioning that covid rates have dropped over the last few weeks in Cheshire East including in the age group for secondary school students. Here at HCCS, rates have remained very very low since the start of the school year and we have had minimal numbers of children spending time at home. I believe that our community wide engagement with safe behaviours in school, (hands, face and space) as well as regular testing and vaccinations have all helped keep our community safe and our children in school and learning. After all that they and we have been through I think we should openly celebrate this as a community.

I'm also pleased to say that the vandalism in toilets that I reported a few weeks ago has greatly reduced and we have been able to identify and sanction the very small numbers of children who were involved. We have invested in extra security around the toilets as well as establishing a system of regular checks throughout the day so that we can identify the specific time period and location of any damage. Staff are also continuing to record any child who is late or not in a lesson so that we can establish the identity of anyone out of lessons and the timeframe that they were not there. Parent social media can really help our community to engage our children in demonstrating positive behaviours and encouraging families to talk to their children about what's going on. Social media is such a powerful tool when used objectively and in a way that opens up positive and constructive conversations. Thanks to all of you who use it as a vehicle for helping our community grow and to build trust.



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The Winter Festival

I'm very excited about our upcoming Winter Festival. This will be a first for our school and a format that I can't wait to see unfold. More details will be published to you soon but in brief, this will be on the 8th December starting at 4:30 and ending at 6:30. This informal, celebration event will be held in the outside spaces under our newly built canopies and I'd like the feel of it to be community spirited and one where we can enjoy being involved in something which is bigger than the sum of its parts. Our children will be running stalls, a number of groups will be treating us to some informal performances, singing and playing and having some fun and there will be some food and drinks available for you to enjoy.

I am intending the festival to be a time when families can mingle with each other and with staff from the school, catch up with friends and enjoy being part of the occasion.

Our covered areas provide good cover from all but the worst weather but with the festival being outside, keep an eye on the weather and wrap up warm.



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The Children's stalls and anyone performing are all raising money for charity. We are staying local with regard to our chosen charities and will be donating 50:50 to two great causes that support people in need in our own community. The charities are Cheshire Without Abuse (<https://www.mycwa.org.uk/>) and Middlewich Food Bank (<https://middlewichdistrict.foodbank.org.uk/>). Please bring plenty of change with you as the stalls won't have a large float for notes.

There will be two entrances to the festival and by ticket only. Tickets will be free and available online soon. We will let you know when you can book them. In considering the space we have available and the health and wellbeing of everyone there, I hope you will all appreciate why there needs to be a limit on how many people will be able to attend and why it needs to be a ticketed event. Can I thank you in advance for your understanding in this. If you are coming to the Festival, can I respectfully encourage anyone who can to walk to the festival rather than drive. This helps keep our roads less busy especially for our neighbouring residents and helps with limiting parking on site. If you do drive, please park sensitively.

For the future, I also intend to host a Spring 2022 as well as a Summer 2022 Festival which will follow a similar format and create a sequence of great traditions for our school but also to tie in to the rich traditions our community already enjoys. As we grow these traditions, how great would it be to be able to invite more and more of the local community, businesses and groups to be part of the events we hold at our school.

Someone famous once said 'we do better when we're together'. Wise words. Thanks to all of you in the community and to all of our families who are making this an even greater reality so that our children are best served.

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Remembrance 2021

On 14th Nov 2021 Holmes Chapel took part in the HC remembrance day parade. We engaged in a parade, a service and the laying of wreaths.

Theodore castle:

The parade itself is a very thought-provoking one. As you walk along the winding path inexorably towards the church, you find yourself thinking about all of those who fought and died during the war. I, personally, found myself thinking about my great grandfathers, Norman, who was an American bomber pilot, flying missions over Europe for most of the war, dropping untold payloads of bombs across Germany, and Sam, who was a reconnaissance pilot for the entire war, flying Spitfires and Hurricanes, completely unarmed, across France, Africa and Italy, taking pictures for the other pilots to attack.

The service starts with the flag bearers walking up the aisle, whilst the new organ plays mournful music, striking the attendants into silence immediately. We sang hymns, spoke prayers, and listened to the vicar and speakers, with wreaths of poppies propped against our chairs. Then it came time to leave the church and go to the war memorial. As the vicar read the list of the fallen, what felt like the entire village fell into absolute silence, not a single noise for miles. In previous years attending, there is often some underlying hubbub of noise somewhere, often the low rumble of cars on the M6, yet this year, there was but one noise in the air; birdsong. The simple sound of birdsong is often mentioned in war, such as before the Somme offensive, yet this time, instead of being a harbinger of doom, it gave me a sense of hope, hope that one day, we may finally find the peace that all of those people died trying to gain for us.

I felt incredibly reflective taking part in the remembrance day parade, it allowed me time to be thankful for the sacrifices those before me made and to remember the thousands of young men lost to the war. The march of so many villagers and the overcrowded church showed a community that was grateful of sacrifice and a community that was mourning young men who did not get the chance to live and see the world as it changed from the war, men my age who hadn't been able to experience life to itself fullest.

In addition to this, the school raised £146 for the royal British legion by way of poppy sales in the run up to remembrance Sunday.

A poignant service, and something the school was honoured to be a part of.

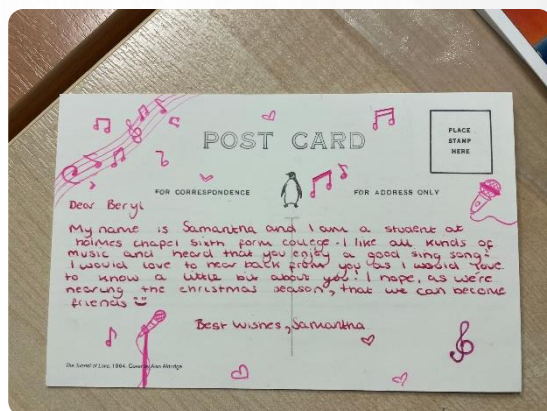

As we approach the season of Advent, some of our European neighbours have their own celebrations to look forward to in the next couple of weeks.

In German-speaking countries, children will be celebrating Nikolaustag on 6th December. They will leave shoes by the door or window on the evening of 5th December and 'der Heilige Nikolaus' (Saint Nicholas) will bring sweets and small gifts for the children. Watch out, though! Saint Nicholas is accompanied by Krampus (who has different names in different regions) who is there to remind children to be good if they want to get treats!



Saint Nicholas will also be celebrated in Alsace and Lorraine (the Eastern areas of France) in the same way, causing much excitement for the children.



Saint Nicholas isn't celebrated in Spain, but 6th December just happens to be Día de la Constitución! This is celebrating the day in 1978 when Spanish people voted in a referendum to agree to their new constitution. This was seen as an important step to Spain becoming a constitutional monarchy and democracy. This historical event is celebrated every year with a Bank Holiday.

Checklist:

Keep talking

Stay interested in what they're doing and what they're doing online. Don't be afraid to tackle difficult subjects like cyberbullying, sexting and pornography. Help them to understand the risks of social media and protect equality and reliability of online news. Role-play how to deal with difficult situations. How confident can they be in what they see online? Over the next few weeks, talk together about how to manage some of these challenges and why it's important.

Manage their online reputation

Let them know that anything they post online or message could stay online forever. Remind them that they should only post things online that they wouldn't mind you, their teacher or future employer seeing. Help them to understand the importance of online reputation and how to demonstrate how things that happen years ago can resurface in the future. Adjust controls

Adjust the parental controls on your broadband and internet-enabled devices. Consider playing your child's age. Remember that these controls are only a first line of defence and it's important to have a conversation with your child about online safety and what's important to them to do.

Top tips to support children 14+ (Key stage 4)

Smartphones are central to teens' daily routine, if not integral to it. Whether it's sending something on Snapchat to keep a streak going as soon as they wake up, getting up to speed on news on Twitter or live streaming thoughts about their day on social media, it can be hard to keep teens away from screens.

To support teens, it's more about equipping them with the tools to self-regulate their own screen time and be critical about how it is impacting their well-being. Find tips and advice to help them do just that.

99% spend at least 20.5 hours a week

81% use a smartphone to go to the gym by the age of 15

What do parents say about screen time?

Less screen time limits

Although almost 9 in 10 parents take measures to limit their child's use of devices, parents of teens are still likely to say they're more relaxed about their screen time. They're more likely to say that they have more freedom and less restrictions in how they can use devices. The skill is to manage their own screen time.

Increased use of social media

Half of parents of 14-16s are concerned that their child's use of social media will impact on their mental well-being.
